

A home for health care innovation in D.C.

Sibley Memorial Hospital's Innovation Hub, opened in 2014, provides 6,000 square feet of dedicated space, support staff and equipment, all devoted to helping clinicians, staff and others (including patients' family members and community residents) work through and develop their ideas for new products, new services and new procedures that have the potential to enhance the quality and reduce the cost of health care – not just at Sibley, but at other community hospitals as well.

Making advanced cancer treatment more available to D.C. area residents

The Johns Hopkins Kimmel Cancer Center at Sibley Memorial Hospital brings the most advanced science and medicine, including immunotherapy and clinical trials, to the D.C. area. As part of Johns Hopkins Medicine, its world-renowned physicians work with physician scientists so that new treatments can be quickly translated from the lab to patients. The Johns Hopkins National Proton Therapy Center at Sibley Memorial Hospital opened in October 2019, offering this important new treatment option more readily to D.C. area residents, including those from underserved communities, as well as patients from around the nation and the world. The 80,000-square-foot Center has four treatment rooms, with one earmarked for research. The Center is the only such regional center with a dedicated pediatric team.

Learning to live in a more complex world

The Paul A. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) is one of the nation's leading centers for graduate studies in international affairs. If offers master's degrees – especially for working professionals – in several areas of international affairs, doctoral degrees and several graduate certificates. As of fiscal year 2019, 3,326 JHU SAIS graduates – about 13.3 percent of the School's alumni – were residents of D.C.

In 2016 the School established the Henry A. Kissinger Center for Global Affairs – a research center that is exploring how trends such as the re-emergence of great-power rivalries, climate change and new technologies such as artificial intelligence are reshaping international affairs.
